Landmarks of Development

PHYSICAL, MOTOR AND LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT

SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

0-1 month

Birth size: 7-8 pounds, 20 inches

Feedings: 5-7 per day

Sensory capacities: makes basic distinctions in vision, hearing, smelling, tasting, touch temperature, and

perception of pain

Helpless Asocial

Generalized tension

2-3 months

Sensory capacities: color perception, visual exploration,

oral exploration

Sounds: cries, coos, grunts

Motor ability: controls eye muscles, lifts head when on

stomach

Visually fixates on a face Smiles at a face

May be soothed by rocking

4-6 months

Sensory capacities: localizes sounds

Sounds: babbling, makes most vowels and about half of

the consonants Feedings: 3-5 per day

Motor ability: controls head and arm movements, grasps

rolls over

Expects feeding, dressing, bathing

Recognizes mother

Distinguishes between familiar persons and strangers

No longer smiles indiscriminately

Enjoys being cuddled

7-9 months

Motor ability: controls trunk and hands, sits without

support, crawls (abdomen touching floor)

Develops specific emotional attachment to one

or more caregivers

Protests separation from mother or chief caregiver

Enjoys "peek-a-boo"

10-12 months

Motor ability: controls legs and feet, stands, creeps, uses

pincer grasp of thumb and forefinger

Language: says one or two words, imitates sounds,

responds to simple commands Feedings: 3 meals, 2 snacks

Size at one year: 20 pounds, 29 inches

Expresses anger and affection Expresses fear of strangers Develops curiosity, explores Responds to own name Understands "no-no" Waves "bye-bye" Plays "pat-a-cake"

1-11/2 years

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Walks (10-20 months)
Sits on chair with fair aim
Builds 2-3 cub tower
Makes lines on paper with crayon
Has definite repertoire of words--more than 3 and less than 50
Progresses rapidly with understanding vocabulary

May be upset when separated from mother Obeys limited commands Makes no attempt at communicating information Shows no frustration at not being understood

1½-2 years

Runs, kicks a ball May be capable of bowel and bladder control Has vocabulary of more than 200 words Size at 2 years: 23-30 pounds, 32-35 inches Temper tantrums (1-3 years)
Frequently does opposite of what is told
Displays increased interest in communicating
with others

2-21/2 years

Jumps into air with both feet Takes a few steps on tiptoe Can move fingers independently Uses 2- to 5-word sentences Shows frustration if not understood by adults Imitates parents' actions Displays interest in other children Engages in brief periods of parallel play

$2\frac{1}{2}$ -3 years

Runs smoothly Uses short sentences Size at 3 years: 32-33 pounds, 37-38 inches Grows possessive about toys Enjoys playing alongside another child Gives orders Insists on rigid sameness of routine

3-4 years

Stands on one leg, draws a circle and a cross (4 years) Completes sentences of 6-8 words (4 years) Has become self-sufficient in many routines of home life Size at 4 years: 38-40 pounds, 40-41 inches Displays intense curiosity, asks questions Plays cooperatively with other children Shows interest in other children's bodies (3-5 years)

4-6 years

Skips, broad jumps, dress self Copies a square and a triangle (5 years) Talks clearly, has mastered basic grammar, relates a story Size at 5 years: 42-43 pounds, 43-44 inches

Generally prefers play with other children Becomes competitive Shows evidence of responsibility and guilt
